

Executive Director's Column Care for Creation: Earth Day is Friday April 22nd

"And God saw everything that he had made, and behold, it was very good." (Genesis 1:31)

Many Catholics from an early age can recall reading or hearing these words from the creation stories in Genesis. From this early age, we are taught that all creation is deserving of our care because it is a gift from God. As Catholics,

we recognize this truth through tangible actions that protect the Earth's natural resources, which are essential to the safety and dignity of all people, especially children, the elderly, and all future generations. In *On Care for Our Common Home*, Pope Francis wrote, "everything is interconnected and genuine care for our own lives and relationships with nature is inseparable from fraternity, justice, and faithfulness to others."

Unfortunately, like many issues, care for the environment is rift with partisan rhetoric and division. However, because of our shared fundamental belief that all creation is a gift from God, Catholics can rise above the partisanship and work together to care of our Common Home.

For our part, the New Jersey Catholic Conference advocates for laws and policies that protect the proper use of creation, including animals, plants, and the Earth's natural resources. We encourage our law makers to work together with us and one another to nurture and cherish creation, as God asked us to do at the beginning of history.

We ask all Catholics and people of good will to do their part in safeguarding the abundant resources God gave us to thrive - - and to pass on to future generations. Here are some examples of ways you and your family can help protect our Common Home: start a family "go-green fund" to reduce the use of water, gas, and electric and use the savings on something fun; adopt a road or park; use cloth napkins instead of paper; dry clothes on a close line or drying rack; use a timer to take shorter showers; add a recycling bin at your parish; go to a car wash that uses recycled water; plant a tree; start a garden to reduce grocery trips; or volunteer for community cleanups.

Legislative Update - - First Quarter 2022

The mission of NJCC is to advocate and interact with the Legislative and Executive Branches of state and federal government for the Catholic Church's public policy agenda. Some of the bills and issues we have been working on include:

- The "Working Class Families Anti-Hunger Act." NJCC testified in favor of this ten-bill legislative package that would expand free school breakfasts and lunches to students from working class, middle-income families.
- The Women's Health Protection Act, H.R. 3755, a federal bill, would have imposed abortion-on-demand nationwide at any stage of pregnancy and eliminated pro-life laws at every level of government. H.R. 3755 would have compelled all Americans to fund abortions with their tax dollars and forced health care providers to perform, assist in, and/or refer for abortion against their deeply held beliefs. <u>This bill was</u> <u>defeated in the U.S. Senate on February 28, 2022.</u>
- Chapter 192 Programs (Compensatory Education) for Nonpublic School Students
 provides remedial instruction in reading, language arts, and mathematics for
 nonpublic New Jersey students. Since the per-pupil amount of \$995.33 for these
 services has not been increased since the 2008-2009 school year, NJCC is advocating
 to the legislature for an increase to \$1,300 per-pupil so students can receive the
 services they need to be successful in school.



 Nonpublic school transportation continues to be problematic for many students with the result being that parents receive aid-in-lieu payments instead of transportation. Aid-in-lieu for parents at the current rate of \$1,000 does not always help in getting their children to and from a nonpublic school. Consequently, NJCC is asking the legislature to increase the per-pupil ceiling for nonpublic school transportation from \$1,000 to \$1,150.

Serving Christ by Helping Those in Need



As we await the U.S. Supreme Court's decision on *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization*, a ruling that could overturn *Roe v. Wade*, we ask our parishes and all people of good will to welcome with open arms those facing difficult pregnancies with love and compassion, and to promote pro-life programs such as

<u>Walking with Moms in Need</u>, an initiative launched by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops in 2020. We ask all Catholics to help connect expecting and vulnerable mothers to life-affirming agencies, such as <u>Catholic Charities</u>, and resources such as pregnancy and foster care centers, clothing, food, and housing services, and adoption agencies. The Catholic Church is the leading social services provider in the United States and is here to support mothers who choose life over abortion.

Introducing NJCC's Public Policy Committee

As an organization that exists to advocate for the New Jersey Catholic Church's public policy agenda, NJCC is fortunate to have devoted Catholics who are willing to share their time and expertise in the public policy arena. With more than ten thousand bills introduced during each two-year legislative session, it's vital that those of import to the Church are not pretermitted; and equally important to get expert perspective from the people who would be directly impacted by them.

Seeing a need for laity to have a voice in public policy matters, NJCC's Board of Bishops created a public policy committee to work directly with them and NJCC staff on analyzing bills and policy issues to determine what action is needed.

To ensure equal representation throughout the state, the committee is made up of nineteen members, fourteen of whom are appointed equally by the bishops from each of the seven dioceses. The other five members are at-large members who represent the Knights of Columbus, the Catholic HealthCare Partnership of New Jersey, the Diocesan Directors of Human Resources, the office of the Diocesan Attorneys, and one member from the legislative affairs community.

The objective of the public policy committee is to liaise with NJCC staff and the Board of Bishops on the following:

- Public policy issues of import to the Church
- Recommendations for policies, positions, and issues of study, along with resources such as ad-hoc committees that are needed to carry out the work of NJCC
- Assisting and advising on the development and implementation of programs intended to educate parishioners on public policy matters
- Inspiring action from the faithful on public policy matters that can affect the Church

The committee is chaired by Dr. Daniel Rossi, who serves as an at-large member representing the Knights of Columbus. Dr. Rossi is a former executive director of the Northeastern Regional Association of State Agriculture and Station Directors. The committee's vice-chair is Brenda Rascher, executive director for Catholic social services & director of parish counseling services for the Diocese of Trenton.

In a recent discussion with Rossi and Rascher, each shared their optimism and hope that the efforts of the committee can help influence and motivate Catholics to take a bigger role in public policy issues, including the sanctity of life, feeding and clothing the poor and vulnerable, and the environment.

Understanding New Jersey's Budget Process

Understanding New Jersey's budget process at first may seem or sound complex. But it's not once you understand the basics. Below are the steps that go into making New Jersey's annual budget:

- The budget planning process begins in August, about 11 months before it takes effect. State agencies and departments use this time to identify revenue projections needed for expenses such as salaries and pensions, programs costs, essential services, education, mass transportation, public health infrastructure, and public safety.
- By January, when revenue projections are agreed upon by the Office of Management and Budget (OMB), the state treasurer, and the governor's staff, the budget is submitted to the governor.
- The State of New Jersey

- The planning portion of the budget process typically culminates no later than the fourth
 Tuesday in February, when the governor must deliver the budget to the legislature. The
 governor's budget address typically begins "budget season." After this address, the
 legislature begins to craft its own budget through the Office of Legislative Services (OLS),
 which reflects its own spending and revenue priorities. (Typically the final budget
 compromises between the governor's budget and the legislature's budget.)
- The legislature then conducts a series of hearings by a Budget Committee of each House, including public and departmental hearings.
- After the legislature has completed its committee hearings, and finalizes its budget, the budget must be approved by the Senate and General Assembly as an "Appropriations Act," (which becomes law after it is signed by the governor).
- The budget is then submitted to the governor in June. The governor has until June 30th to approve and sign it into law, as the budget runs on a July 1 to June 30 fiscal year.
- The governor has four options once the budget is received: (1.) to accept it "as is," (2.) reject it and send it back to the legislature, (3.) line-item veto certain spending priorities before signing it into law, or (4.) if revenue projections from the OMB and OLS are far enough apart, sh/e may accept the budget as is and reserve some funding to be released later in the year if enough revenue is collected to cover those investments.
